Checklist of Practice

Always	Sometimes	Not Yet	Caregiver Strategies: What they look like in practice
			1. Staff are trained on the definition, facts, statistics, and effects concerning sexual abuse of children.
			2. One-adult/one-child situations are eliminated, monitored, or reduced.
			3. Information from reliable sources about children's sexual development is available to staff and parents.
			4. Facility has a child sexual abuse prevention policy which is shared with staff and parents.
			5. Staff are trained to recognize signs of child sexual abuse and know how to report concerns.
			6. An atmosphere of open communication and trust exists with the children and their families.
			7. Staff know what to do if a child discloses child sexual abuse to them.
			8. Staff know what to do if an adult discloses knowledge of child sexual abuse to them.
			9. Partner with parents and agencies to support children's retention and success.
			10. Offer a parent-teacher conference during the year.
			11. Provide an annual opportunity for parents and staff to give program feedback.
			12. Staff consistently use correct terms for anatomy.
			13. Staff use social emotional teaching strategies to build the protective factors in children.
